


27th December 2024



The book of Isaiah provided a suitable group study for Commission delegates. Its elaborate Christological focus made missional discussions a natural outflow of the conversations. 




COMMISSION BIBLE STUDY

MISSIONS SIMULATIONS

The Missions Simulations session was set aside to help delegates connect with as many mission partners as possible. It gave practical experience of what it is like to be in various mission contexts. It focused on cultural adaptation, digital missions, creative campus evangelism, medical missions, virtual reality, mission to children, among others. Delegates visited at least 3 simulation stations for 20 – 25 minutes at each station to see, ask questions, engage and register for further training.

STEM Missionary -South East Asia

Partner: Youth With a Mission (YWAM)

This opportunity is for teachers of English interested in learning a new language, teaching English to native speakers of that language, and sharing the love of Christ.

STEM CD – ELP -Daadab

Partner: Windle International Kenya

The English Learning Program (ELP) aims to help refugees (often vulnerable) by equipping them with language skills to enable them integrate with their host society and access better opportunities. Participants must be graduate teachers of English with interest in missions among Muslims.

STEM Missionary - Samburu

Partner: Samburu Action & Awareness Program (SAAP)

The primary tool in this program is integral mission. Participants work as a volunteer teacher and others as livelihood officers, mobilizing the community to consider alternative livelihoods.

STEM Missionary -Samburu

Partner: World Concern & Africans to Africa - (A2A) A2A aims to mobilize churches in reached areas of Africa to raise resources to support churches in least reached or unreached areas. In this program, the participants work alongside local pastors to train and mentor evangelists, support church planting and help fulfil World Concern's vision of holistic development.

FOCUS MISSIONS DEPARTMENT

Explore our Short-Term Missions programs.

We raise Mission Minded Believers who will take the Transforming Power of the Gospel wherever God Sends them.

Global Program (GP)-Urban & rural Kenya

Partner: InterVarsity USA

In this 45 years Missions Program, participants are introduced to cross cultural missions, missions to people of other faiths (Islam & Hinduism), and mission to the urban poor. It runs for 7 weeks between May and July every year. Students on long holiday available for the entire time except final year students are eligible.

LIGHT-P -Northern Kenya

Partners: Churches

LIGHT-P stands for Least Reached, Integral, Gospel Centered, Homegrown, Transformational Program. This is our flagship short-term cross-cultural mission exposure program open to students, associates, staff, fresh graduates and ex-candidates in transitional programs. The program runs for 4 – 6 weeks during long holidays divided into orientation, field experience and debriefing.

Interact -Norway

Partner: NKSS, Norway

Interact is an exchange program that involves IFES movements in six countries – Norway, Kenya, Colombia, Madagascar, Bangladesh and Brazil. The program aims to strengthen youth leadership and train in cross cultural understanding and international work. The program runs for 12 months – 10 in Norway and 2 in Kenya.

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LEADING SERVANTS; CU TRANSITIONS

The last two months have been seasons of transitions in the Christian Unions. An opportunity to lead the Christian Union in any capacity is one of the most life changing events. Most of the leaders have never had such high impact opportunities where they are expected to deliver. CU leaders are often busy, forced to mature in faith and wait on God, promoted from members to leaders in less than a week and have a short but eventful stint of leadership. HERE IS A QUICK HACK FOR SERVICE; A NOTE FOR NEW CU LEADERS.



As a CU leader, one can easily be overwhelmed by the many tasks and responsibilities that accompany the role. You may find yourself jumping from one meeting to another. This can in the long run affect other parts of your life such as your academics or social life. Striking a balance is key. And this is where planning comes in handy. Note down the things that need to be done on a daily, weekly and monthly basis identifying what is urgent and needs to be prioritized. Avoid procrastination at all cost. Set simple achievable goals for each day ensuring that no area of your life is neglected and this includes your rest. Audit how you spend your time by reviewing the day's activities. Serving should not become burdensome because of poor planning or poor time management. Commissioned to serve.
